A Message to the Parish *by Fr. Martin Yabroff*



Dear Friends,

We begin this month the season of Lent, the forty days (not counting Sundays) leading up to Easter. This is a season of spiritual reflection, of honest self-examination and renewal through trusting God. We begin with Ash Wednesday on February 17, and proceed with worship, study, prayer, service, and reflection on Jesus' life and passion, God's grace and love, and our call as Jesus' followers to share Good News with this community and world.

At our Annual Meeting, I shared some reflections about St. Andrew's and our mission – they are reprinted here:

This is the parish of St. Andrew - a missionary. One of the first disciples to be called by Jesus, he right away goes and calls his brother and brings him to Jesus. Later, when some Greeks (sophisticated, worldly folks) wanted to know Jesus, Andrew facilitates the meeting. Our Collect this morning could have been written for the feast of St. Andrew: "Give us grace, O Lord, to answer readily the call of our savior Jesus Christ and proclaim to all people the Good News of his salvation, that we and the whole world may perceive the glory of his marvelous works..."

Andrew also was involved with the miracle of the loaves and fishes. When the disciples were faced with a huge multitude, whom Jesus said they were to feed, and they were overwhelmed, it was Andrew who looked around and found a boy with a lunch bag – five loaves and two dried fish – and brought them to Jesus. That says something about facing a challenge and offering whatever we can, whatever is at hand, for God to use. That is important in challenging times.

And these are challenging times, not only economically and personally for many of us, but also as a church in the 21st century and in the Northwest. We are called to share the Good News of Jesus Christ with all those around us, just like our namesake Andrew. Yet church attendance is declining in churches over-all.

Especially here in the Northwest, fewer and fewer people know what Christian faith is really about. While people around us often distrust the media, they tend to believe the negatives the media reports about churches and religion. To many folks today, Christianity seems like a medieval jousting society – irrelevant at best, and possibly dangerous.

Here at St. Andrew's, we have the same Average Sunday Attendance as two years ago (105 in 2007, 109 in 2008, and now 105 again in 2009). We are called to impact our community, to serve our neighbors spiritually

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as well as physically. We are not to be pushy or judgmental or manipulative – that is not Andrew’s way, nor Jesus’ – but we are called to share what we value in Jesus, to engage in spiritual conversation with those around us that they may ‘come and see’ and know Jesus, God’s grace and truth, for themselves.

One of the challenges before us as St. Andrew’s is to be mission-minded rather than maintenance-minded. A maintenance mindset is concerned with maintaining what we have, staying afloat and together. But it also means focusing on the programs and ministries we are already doing. In contrast, a mission mindset is focused not on our mission programs and ministries, but on God’s mission, what God is doing and seeking to do in and through and if need be in spite of us.

God cares for the people of the Northwest and beyond. God calls us to be part of that caring and reaching out. We need to focus on this larger scene and story, the spiritual needs of the larger community, of which we as a congregation are a part.

How are we doing? We are making progress. St. Andrew’s does reach out to our community with signs and mailings, website and welcoming services. (Some can be improved.) We emphasize that St. Andrew’s mission is carried out by all of us at home and work and school and the community, not just here in church. We give away 10% of our total contributions for outreach needs beyond the parish. In 2009, that was over \$23,000. And we support diocesan mission and ministries – ethnic ministries, youth programs, strengthening churches, new projects (less and less goes to the bishop’s administration). These two items last year in our budget – Outreach and our diocesan ministries – were 25% of our budget. We give away one of every four dollars we raise, for God’s work beyond ourselves.

We are being good stewards of our resources, and working on giving even more generously (we cannot out-give God!). Of our 77 pledges received thus far for 2010, nine are new, and 30 are increased over last year. God is calling and we are responding. We are managing our resources and balancing our budget through giving and fundraising so that we may be ready witnesses and apostles, excited about God’s purposes and love.

Sunday School and Youth Ministry are important ministries, not just for our own children but for those who visit and may be hungry for Christ. This coming year, I look for us to develop and expand our adult Christian formation, our adult classes. We need to go deeper in our faith, in our openness to God. I look this year for more opportunities to learn about faith, to delve deeper into the Bible, and to develop spiritual disciplines such as prayer. These will help us be better missionaries and witnesses of God in our lives and our midst.

As we shift our focus from ourselves and our own work to God’s mission in and through us towards the larger world, I want to say something about our Epistle reading (1 Cor. 12:12-31a). St. Paul speaks of how the body has many parts, many distinct and different members, yet we are one body. Just as the rest of the body cannot discount the hand or ear because they are different, so also the body must not think that the hand is on its own to do what it wants separate from the body.

The church is not me as Rector, nor the Vestry, nor any committee. It is all of us. We work together to carry out God’s mission. I hope to grow in this collaboration, and hope we all will this year.

To illustrate: we give generously for God’s work through St. Andrew’s, and we tithe for Outreach. These funds are not the Community Outreach committee’s money. That Committee exercises excellent leadership and works hard to see these funds are wisely used for the greatest impact locally and globally. They act on our behalf, as part of the body that is St. Andrew’s.

Let us see what 2010 will bring to this world through St. Andrew’s. Here we go. **Amen.**

The Outreach Committee is pleased to once again offer educational scholarships. These scholarships range in amount from \$100 to \$1,000 and are awarded annually. Funds will be dispersed in May, 2010 for educational programs taking place between June 2010 and May 2011.

Community Outreach 2009 - Another Generous Year

The Community Outreach Committee meets quarterly to disperse ten percent of St. Andrew's total contributions to our community. The members of the Community Outreach Committee represent both services, and a variety of interests at St. Andrew's and in the community.

Fall quarter (October through December), the committee had \$9,132 to disperse. There are internal needs that are funded from this amount; the Rector's Discretionary Fund was funded \$300, and St. Andrew's contribution to seminary education is one percent of our income, (\$913). This year, the seminary contributions are being sent to Seminary of the Southwest, the Episcopal seminary that Jessie Smith attends. The St. Andrew's scholarships also come from the community outreach funds (\$750).

Causes outside of St. Andrew's were funded as well. Shared Housing Services received \$250 for their Referral/Match home share program. Shared Housing Services is a non-profit agency that matches home-owners needing financial assistance or services with those needing housing at reduced costs. SHS was able to set up 497 matches in 2008.

Neighborhood Clinic was given \$500 for salary support and their medication program. The Neighborhood Clinic operates in the hill-top neighborhood providing health care for those without insurance or unable to pay for care. As you can imagine, the number of people needing assistance has grown in the present economy. They also welcome volunteers at the clinic, particularly medical care providers, social service or counselors, or interpreters.

Pediatric Interim Care (PICS) was given \$250 for intensive case management. PICS is an organization that supports foster families that take on the tremendous challenge of fostering babies that are born drug-addicted.

We contributed toward the purchase of food for Jackson Street Food Bank and the Food Bank at Salvation Army, \$1000 each. We also contributed \$250 to Nativity House to be used for their greatest need.

Many of the goals the vestry has been working toward are long-range goals and will continue to be a work in progress in the year ahead.

The goals the vestry set in 2009 were:

- ◆ **Grow Deeper Spiritually:** Christian formation is something that we all need to continue to work on regardless of our number of years. "Christian education is not just for the children." We hope to provide many opportunities for all to grow deeper, spiritually, in the upcoming months.
- ◆ **Increase Parish Fund-raising:** We have already started planning for special events this year.
- ◆ **Promote and Publicize the Church:** We are looking at continuing to improve our website.
- ◆ **Develop Our Infrastructure:** (organization, communication, physical plant) Continues to be a work in progress
- ◆ **Build Up Our Ministries With Children, Youth and Adults:** We are back to the formation in spiritual growth.

My last thought for you this month would be from the Contemporary English Version of I Corinthians 12:27:

"Together you are the body of Christ. Each one of you is part of His body."

< **Another Generous Year...**

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We contributed \$1,263 to Tacoma Power Energy Assistance program, a program that assists customers when they are unable to afford lights or heat. We contributed \$1,263 to Associated Ministries Severe Weather Fund to aid in the housing and shelter of homeless during cold weather. Finally, we contributed \$1,263 to Episcopal Relief Services to be used for emergencies in our local area.

During Advent, we were able to use the funds to donate \$250 to Caring for Kids, and purchase \$250 worth of gift cards for Exodus Housing clients, and \$250 worth of gift cards for the families of the McNeil Island inmates. We also purchased gifts for two families, which you, the generous members of St. Andrew's, bought back and donated. This enabled us to sponsor a family from Phoenix Housing Network (Ruby Slippers) and Lakewood Area Shelter Association. Thanks to Larry Phillips and friends for doing the initial shopping.

In all, we were able to distribute \$22,979 for 2009 (WOW!!). A complete listing of the contributions funded by St. Andrew's is available in the 2009 Annual Report. We are able to distribute these funds because of your generosity. Thank you.

The Kairos Prison Ministry Needs Your Help

As many of you have gotten to know by now, Steven Gaub, Norbert Herriges, and I are volunteers with the Kairos Prison Ministry. We are just three of the group of volunteers who go to up to four different prisons in Western Washington – the Clallam Bay Correctional Center, the McNeil Island Correctional Center, the Monroe Correctional Complex, and the

Washington Corrections Center for Women (in Purdy, WA).

Twice a year, once in the spring and once in the fall, the volunteers of the Kairos Prison Ministry go to these prisons for a three-and-a-half day religious retreat. Up to 42 prisoners at each of these prisons are chosen to be participants of this religious retreat. Many of these prisoners (in the process of breaking the law by committing crimes and ending up in prison as a result) have left the church and have also broken their relationship with Christ. The Kairos volunteers go into these prisons with the purposes of helping the prisoners who are taking part during the Kairos Weekend to regain a relationship with Christ and to help those that will soon be finishing their prison terms by encouraging them to start their lives anew by going down the right paths in life. From my personal experience as a volunteer who goes to the Clallam Bay Correctional Center, I have actually seen changes in certain participants during the weekend from being shy and inward people who don't want to take part in any activities to more open people who readily take part in activities. The correctional officers at the Clallam Bay Correctional Center have really liked our presence at the prison as it has helped make the prison a much calmer and safer place (there was a time when they didn't like working there because it had become such a dangerous place). Volunteers with the Kairos Prison Ministry are currently having a reunion at the Stafford Creek Correctional Center on every fifth Saturday with the hope that we will soon be having Kairos Weekends there as well. Steven Gaub and Norbert Herriges will be going to the Kairos Weekend at the McNeil Island Correctional Center between April 29 – May 2, and I will be at the Kairos Weekend at the Clallam Bay Correctional Center between March 25 – 28.

The volunteers of the Kairos Prison Ministry, who go into these prisons, need your help and support in this endeavor. There are ways that you can support this ministry.

- ◆ **Baking or making cookies.** Each volunteer of the Kairos Prison Ministry is required to bring with him/her 100 dozen cookies to the Kairos Weekend that he/she will be taking part in. When the prisoners

From Our Seminarian

Greetings from Austin Texas where spring has sprung by mid- January and one can bicycle all winter long! After one full semester at the Seminary of the Southwest I have come to rely on an idea that can both spark conversation or gracefully end a heated theological conversation; mystery. Trusting in the goodness behind the mystery of this world is about all one can do in the face of a complex suffering and beautiful world. So as I study pre-exilic Israel, church polity, Hispanic ministries or ancient Hebrew and look for God, I often have to remind myself that God is the constant, but the undefinable. God's ways are the mystery. We study what we can to gather clues to lead us into that mystery. So what I mean to say is that the first semester of seminary is utterly disorienting and rattles one's preconceived notions of self, ministry, church and God. I suppose that is why I will be studying here for another two and a half years, to help make sense of the mystery of God and the way the church lives into that mystery.

I am happy to share with you that I have been invited to attend BACOM this February, which is the next step in discerning a call to ordained ministry. It is often said among my peers at the seminary both in regards to our academic and spiritual formation and our continuing journeys of discernment to 'trust the process'. It's good advice being there is not much choice in the matter; we (all Christians living into their Baptismal Covenant) have handed our lives over for God's service and trust that the church will help us to discern God's will. So please keep all of the Commission on Ministry members and aspirants attending BACOM in your prayers this February that we will be faithful to our calls.

Over the last several months, I have received so many expressions of support from everyone at St. Andrews. Being in a new city, meeting a new community and living a very different kind of life than I had been in Tacoma can be disorienting and sometimes isolating. I cannot express how much it means to receive reminders of your prayers and support for me here. I remember then that I did not come here alone, and although my parish community is not near me, they are still a huge piece of my time here in seminary. Thank you for discerning and faithfully supporting this call from God.

I will look forward to visiting with everyone at St. Andrews on Sunday February 21st, the weekend of BACOM. I will keep you all in my thoughts and prayers until then.

at these prisons receive a dozen cookies each night that the Kairos volunteers are there, it really touches the prisoners and helps us by having them open their minds, their hearts, and their souls to Christ. All of the cookies that you either bake or make are seen as a symbol of Christ's love to those we visit in the prisons. As I have said before, I will bake up to 50 dozen cookies. If any of you can match that output, that would be fantastic. If you can't, that will be great too. Please remember – Steve and Norbert will also need your help with this.

♦ **Decorating Cookie Bags.** The dozens of cookies that the Kairos volunteers give to each member of the prison staff, each correctional officer, and to each prisoner at these prisons goes into a decorated cookie bag. Prisoners have been touched by the decorations that they see colored on the cookie bag that they receive. I currently have a good sized stack of bags to decorate and will be getting more. I would really appreciate it if I could get some assistance in decorating them.

♦ **Green Agape.** It currently costs \$175 to sponsor a prisoner to take part during a Kairos Weekend at one of these prisons. If you do not feel like helping with this, Steve, Norbert, and I would really appreciate your financial assistance with travel expenses and the expenses of getting the ingredients to make or bake cookies for the Kairos Weekends that we go on. Any amount that you would be willing to give would be greatly appreciated.

♦ **Prayer.** Prayer is a powerful symbol of Christ's protection
