A Message to the Parish:

Dear Friends,

An exciting Fall season is before us at St. Andrew's. Lots of activities and opportunities are planned — remember that not everyone can do everything — but we have much richness in which to respond to God's calling and to grow and learn and serve. And after a hopefully restful and renewing Summer (I enjoyed two weeks in California with family and friends and hiking in the High Sierras), here we go.

We begin with five Sundays of special parish activities:

- September 4** – our choir begins again after their Summer break, and we pray on labor day weekend for our community and all workers and those seeking work.
- September 11** – Sunday School and Adult classes begin for the Fall. After the 10 am service, we have a Parish Picnic at Sunset Terrace Park, 19th Ave. just uphill from Bridgeport.
- September 18** – we have an Activity Faire after each service to learn more about our many parish ministries and whether our Lord is calling you to consider sharing in one of them.
- September 25** – Alcoholism Awareness Sunday (both services), with a guest speaker and literature from the diocesan Committee on Alcohol and Substance Abuse.
- October 2** – Blessing of the Animals (The Feast of St. Francis) at both services. Hunger Walk that afternoon (our team is being organized by our Community Outreach committee.)

Beginning in September:

Sunday School: Kit Adams is getting our Sunday School organized and started this Fall, and then Connie West will in October become our new Sunday School Administrator. Classes will be offered for pre-school, elementary, middle school and high school youth during the first part of our 10 am worship service. Teachers are needed to

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share prepared, Bible-based lessons and your own faith and enthusiasm. Please speak with Kit Adams about the possibility of helping one Sunday per month.

Monday afternoon Bible Study

begins again on September 12. We meet in the Ada Webb Room from 1 to 2 pm, and will be discussing the Gospel of St. John. No background is required; large-print bibles are available, and visitors from any church are always welcome.

We will offer two evening Adult classes:

1. **Episcopal 201: Going Deeper.** Four sessions (September 12, 19, 26 & October 3) from 7 to 8 pm, led by Fr. Martin and others, on Christian Spirituality, the Bible, Sacraments, and Christian history. Each session will include discussion on how we can go deeper in faith and service. Offered for newcomers and visitors, parish members interested in review and renewal, and for adults preparing for Confirmation, Reception or Reaffirmation of Baptismal Vows. (Preparation for Confirmation, etc. will begin with these sessions and continue with a personal 'rule' of life.) Fr. Kendall Haynes and David Tinsley will assist.
2. **St. Andrew's** will join with members of **St. Charles Borromeo Catholic** and **St. Mark's Lutheran churches** (both nearby) to learn more about **global and local hunger and our Christian response.** We will be reading the book: Exodus from Hunger, by David Beckmann. Mondays, October 17, 24; Nov. 7, 14;

7-8:30 pm, at a different parish each week.

Music and Choir:

After four years of wonderful ministry with us, Dr. Jonathan Wohlers stepped down as Music Director to go to Trinity Lutheran church in Parkland (next to PLU). *We rejoice to welcome Naomi Shigo as our new Organist and Choir Director, beginning October 1.* (Join me in thanking Marian Warren and our Choir for worship leadership in September.) Adults and youth are eagerly invited to join our choir as a new chapter opens.

Our **Glory and Praise** continues in September, on the second Sunday of each month. New members are invited to build up this joyful part of our worship life.

Meanwhile, very good work is being done by our **Celtic Faire** committee, led by Liz Herriges and Rena Girard. This coming Celtic Faire may be our best ever!

Building and Grounds Coordinator Bill Brice has been tireless in improving our facility, working with many skilled and able parishioners. Memorial and Finance committees are looking ahead to preliminary studies for improving restrooms and access via an elevator. And **Community Outreach** continues their good work in extending Christ's love to those around us.

Our Holy Conversations team has been working hard, and led us in July in our third conversation, this one regarding our mission statement: 'To know Christ and to make Christ known'. They will finish their work in September and report to the Vestry and us all this Fall.

I am thankful to serve here with Fr. Ed Sterling and (while he is here) Fr. Kendall Haynes. I am thankful to serve

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with Linda our Secretary and Donna our bookkeeper; Wardens Ken and Skip; Kit, Sunshine and soon Connie and Naomi, and all our Vestry and ministry leaders.

St. Andrew's Fourth Annual Celtic Faire

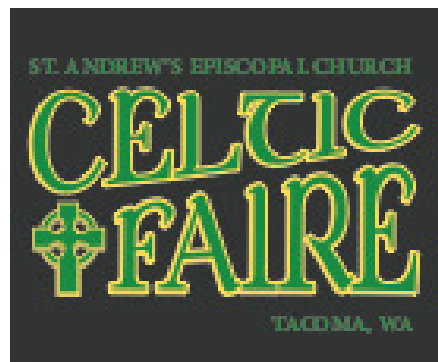

Senior Warden Musings

Two recent events took place and I was struck about how similar they are. The Rev. Canon Joan Anthony from the Diocese was substituting for Fr. Martin and the Gospel, and her sermon was regarding the feeding of the 5,000 with just a few fish and a few loaves of bread.

When I was young in Sunday School, I remember this Bible story and wondered how this could happen and how they could get so much out of so little and still have some left over. This was likely my first small understanding of the word "miracle." The message from Rev Anthony pointed out how sometimes you can get spectacular results from just a small effort, and that there is abundance everywhere.

In July, you may have read about a terrible accident on I-90 near Bellevue. There were 2 large trucks and several cars involved in this chain reaction and in it, a girl named Rachel, who was 9 years old, died. For her birthday coming up this year, instead of gifts, she was asking her friends and relatives for money for a project to put clean water in a village in Africa. Her project had collected just short of the \$300 that was her goal on the day she died. How does a girl that is not quite 9 years old learn such selflessness and compassion?

Somehow the news organizations learned of the story, and it was spread through the wire-services and on-line news organizations and donations started coming in. On August 13, the total raised in Rachel's name was \$1,026,043 and more coming each day. There were 54,000 donors recorded so far and more

money is arriving each day. My nephew, Grant, came back to Portland just last year from 2 years in the Peace Corps in a small village in the country of Togo in Africa. He lived in just such a village that could have used a better source of water. Because there is very little electricity in the rural areas, most water comes from hand dug wells, and it takes a large part of the day to get water to all the houses and gardens. He would pay a young boy about 5 cents a day to bring 2 gallons each day to the house he shared with a small family. He used it for drinking, washing and cooking.

I think about this girl who had a very big goal for hers of \$300 and now that has turned into an unbelievable result of over a million dollars and is still growing! I believe that there will be many villages in several countries with cleaner and more abundant water and that many women and children won't have to spend hours back and forth to gather a few gallons of water every day.

I am sure you will agree that it is a tragedy for this little girl to have to die to accomplish this. Her mother wrote to donors, "In the face of unexplainable pain you have provided undeniable hope."

A few fish and a few loaves of bread and \$300....

Associated Ministries 31st Annual Hunger Walk

Why Walk? Why Give?

The Answer. . . the incredible need.

The statistics are astounding. In Washington, one in five households reported they didn't have enough money to buy the food they needed in 2009. In Pierce County, there were a total of 445,765 *unduplicated* visits to food banks and 11,586,135 meals provided! Also in Pierce County, more than 140,000 children, seniors and adults seek-out food every month.

Just \$1,000 will provide over one year's worth of food for a family of four. We can do that and even more!

Here's how you can help.

Become a part of the St. Andrew's walk team, the St. Andrew's Fishers, to help raise over \$350,000 to fight hunger. You can become a member of our team by registering on line at www.associatedministries.org OR pick up a team brochure in the Ada Webb Room, or contact one of these current team members: Peggy Schnack, Jeff Boyce, Pam Tinsley, Kristen Mellis, or Margo Fleschman.

Can't walk? That's ok because you can help in other ways. You can donate cash by supporting one of the walkers. Look for their Hunger Walk badges after the services during September or go

online at www.associatedministries.org to make a donation to the team. You can also volunteer by registering on line.

Also, stay tuned to hear about some creative ways that you can become involved. There will be announcements in the bulletin and at the services about upcoming events.

Half of the proceeds from Hunger Walk will benefit the Emergency Food Network (EFN), Pierce County's non-profit distribution center for nearly 70 food banks, hot meal sites, and shelters. The other 50 percent of the funds raised by the Hunger Walk will go to local and international hunger relief agencies designated by each walker, including FISH Food Banks (St. Andrew's/ Temple Beth El), St. Leo's Food Connection, and several other food banks in the area. Funds not designated by walkers go to Church World Service to distribute internationally where need is greatest.

A few weeks ago Pam Tinsley gave the homily and quoted the motto of the Daughters of the King. It seems so appropriate for this event:

"I am but one, but I am one. I can't do everything, but I can do something."

The Community Outreach Committee Report

The St Andrew's Community Outreach Committee met on July 17 and distributed \$6,000 for the second quarter of 2011. The following organizations and funds were awarded money from our current allocation:

St Andrew's Scholarship Fund \$750

This Fund annually awards scholarships to any currently enrolled or potential student. The Fund is managed by a committee of St Andrew's members and the money is deposited in the education provider's scholarship account.

The St Andrew's Rector's Discretionary Fund \$542

This Fund is administered solely by the Rector and is used for any Christian purpose that the Rector deems appropriate.

The St Andrew's Seminary Fund \$608

This Fund normally is used for the support of a Seminary that is recommended by the Rector and approved by the Vestry. At this time, the moneys in this Fund are being sent to the Episcopal Seminary of the Southwest for the support of Jessica Smith, a member of St Andrew's currently studying toward ordination.

Nativity House, Tacoma \$200

Tacoma's Nativity House is the only daytime drop-in shelter for the homeless in the area. Our donation is for general support and is one third of our 2011 annual pledge of \$600.00.

Salvation Army \$500

Our donation is to the local post of the Salvation Army for use in their Tacoma food bank.

Joint Base Lewis-McChord Air Terminal USO \$500

Our donation to the Joint Base Lewis-McChord Air Terminal USO will help provide food and beverages to the soldiers, airman and marines who are waiting for transportation to their assignments in Europe and Asia including the war zone in Afghanistan.

Associated Ministries of Tacoma & Pierce County \$500

The Associated Ministries is a non-profit group of Tacoma area religious organizations that have joined together for the Christian good of the people of Tacoma and Pierce County. Our donation is for their general support.

Our Little Roses, Honduras \$500

The Our Little Roses Ministries' Home for Girls in San Pedro Sula, Honduras, has become an oasis of hope and opportunity for young girls by transforming the lives of these once destitute girls. St Andrew's sponsors a young girl by the name of Kathy Carbajal.

Shared Housing Services, Tacoma \$500


The Shared Housing Services of Tacoma provides technical assistance that facilitates the matching of those who wish to share their homes with families needing low-cost housing. Our donation helps provide low-income, homeless families with up to 18 months in which to recover from the crises that have caused their homelessness while providing a stable, wholesome family atmosphere in which to raise children.

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St. Andrew's Has Made One More Step into the 21st Century!

We now have "electronic giving" capability. If you have looked at the St. Andrew's website recently (<http://saintandrewstacoma.org>) you may have noticed the  button in the left-hand side column.

We have established a contract with a company called VANCO. This is a company that handles **secure** electronic financial transactions. Ours is a sub-contract under the Diocese of Olympia. Giving through this is just like paying any bill electronically or placing an order with any online commercial source.

If you do not have online access, you can complete an "authorization form" to have automatic withdrawals from your bank checking or savings account. If you have web access, go to our website to find the "Donate" button. When you click on the "Donate" button, you will be taken to forms to complete your request and how you would like to pay. You can make a payment from your bank (EFT, electronic funds transfer) using either a checking or savings account. You can make a one time donation or recurring donations automatically on a regular basis (weekly/monthly). Credit card donation is also possible (there is a service fee for this). When you make your donation you will be asked to select how you want your donation to be used and the options are: PLEDGE, BUILDING, ENDOWMENT, MEMORIAL, OTHER. If you make a MEMORIAL donation you have the opportunity to designate in whose memory the donation is made.

You are encouraged to set up a password protected profile so that future donations through this method are even

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easier. After you have establish a "profile" you will be able to print out report forms each month, or year as appropriate, that show what donations you have made through this method.

These donations are securely sent directly to the church bank account, so have no contact with people along the way. If you have any further question please see Virginia Gaub or stop by the table during the Activity Fair on September 18. Information will be available there.

National Recovery Month

This year's National Recovery Month theme, "**Join the Voices for Recovery: Recovery Benefits Everyone,**" emphasizes that all Americans have the opportunity to access provisions within the Affordable Care Act and Mental Health Parity and Addictions Equity Act (MHPAEA), aimed to improve physical and emotional health while ensuring people will receive the care they need at a more reasonable cost. Substance use and mental disorders touch everyone in some way—regardless of race, age, gender, workplace, geography, or socioeconomic level. Substance use disorders—which include misuse, dependence, or addiction to alcohol and/or legal or illegal drugs—and mental health problems—which include depression, anxiety disorder, mood disorder, post-traumatic stress disorder (PTSD), and others—are major public health concerns in the United States, but prevention and treatment services are available and effective. Studies have shown that substance use disorders include both physical and mental dependencies, and have characteristics similar to other chronic diseases, such as asthma, hypertension, and diabetes. If an individual's family member or friend's personality, physical appearance, or behavior has changed drastically, it may be a symptom of a substance use or mental disorder.

Other common physical and behavioral signs and symptoms may include:

- Drastic changes in eating habits or unexplained weight loss or gain
- Poor physical coordination

- Red, watery eyes or pupils that are larger or smaller than usual
- Tremors or shakes of the hands, feet, or head
- Changes in friends or sudden avoidance of old social circle
- Drop in grades at school or performance at work
- General lack of motivation, energy, and self-esteem
- Thoughts of suicide or long-lasting sadness or irritability
- Frequent outbursts of anger or aggressive behavior

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Neighborhood Clinic- Tacoma

\$1,000

The Neighborhood Clinic in Tacoma provides free medical care to patients who cannot afford or do not have access to healthcare. They focus only on acute or episodic illness by providing medication and initial healthcare. Our donation is for the medication program and support of salaries for the non-volunteer workers.

FISH Food Banks of Pierce County

\$400

The FISH Food Banks of Pierce County consists of seven food bank sites serving individuals and families across Pierce County of which our Jackson Street Food Bank is one. Their goal is to provide each client with enough nutritious food to make three meals a day for three consecutive days. Our donation is for general support for the entire system.
